#### **Adolescent Health Specialist Clinic at Western Health:**

Western Health provides Specialist Clinics for patients who are secondary school aged up to their 18th Birthday who require assessment and management of Adolescent health conditions. Patients will be triaged by a Consultant Paediatrician into management pathways according to specific clinical requirements:

These referral guidelines are for Paediatric Specialist clinics provided at Joan Kirner Women's and Children's at Sunshine Hospital only.

Referrals may be triaged to alternative Paediatric Specialist Clinics at Western Health.

#### Conditions not seen by Adolescent Health Specialists at Western **Health:**

- Cognitive testing.
- Multidisciplinary Autism Spectrum Disorder assessments.
- Eating disorders where the patient has a significantly lowered BMI and would require an inpatient stay.
- Adolescent gynaecology concerns for a patient < 16 years of age.

#### **Adolescent Health Alarm Symptoms:**

Suicidality

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Acute conditions requiring immediate assessment – please refer the patient to the Sunshine Hospital Emergency Department.

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# **Access & Referral Priority Adolescent Health:**

The clinical information provided in your referral will determine the triage category. The triage category will affect the timeframe in which the patient is offered an appointment.

\*Note: Young people will be seen with their parents / caregivers and will have a confidential individual interview with the adolescent health clinician.
